



This term we have learnt about rocks, we have learnt about 3 different types of rock; sedimentary, metamorphic, and igneous.


When we had a look at two different types of soil which were clay and sandy soil. We were seeing how it feels, how it looks and how it's made up.




















During our art lessons, Year 6 have been sketching the different parts of the face. We found this quite tricky but persevered and produced some amazing results.






In our science lessons, Year 6 have been studying Evolution and Inheritance. We spent time investigating fossils and the information they can give us. We learnt that there are 3 different types of fossils: trace fossils, mummification and remains. Trace fossils can be in the form of footprints, eggs or poo. They can give scientists a wealth of information such as what the diet of the animal was like, the height and weight of the animal as well as information on whether they travelled alone or in herds.

We made our own series of fossils to show how an animal may have changed over the course of thousands of years and what this can tell scientists.
